Here's how it usually works: People arrive any time in the 30 minutes before the meeting's official start to visit with others, perhaps share what they are reading (or not), meet new people in the neighborhood or just find a good place to sit. People come to the library for different reasons whereas we will gather together for the same purpose.

## History of Herald Harbor, Part 1

As we celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the founding of Herald Harbor, here is a heavily edited version of its history as written by Gloria Spence in 1996. This will be a 2-part version with more to come next month. If you'd like to read the complete version of Gloria's History email me at lcrump37@gmail.com. Notice the familiar street names in this article.

The land that became Herald Harbor was initially owned by Henry E. Hall, an entrepreneur from Youngstown, Ohio, who purchased it in 1886. Prior to this purchase, the land was a plantation of peach and apple orchards and farm land. Edward E. Hall, remembers trees being felled and drawn by horses down to the foot of Bonaparte Trail to the river, where they were transported by barge to be used as electric and telephone poles. Produce also went out locally and were taken to Baltimore.

Herald Harbor began on May 17, 1924 when Rhey Snodgrass, William Shelton and C.S. Eddy, officials of The Washington Herald newspaper, purchased 250 acres from Frank and Nellie Kyle, and 210 acres from Joseph and Adda Hall. Long Point was excluded, as were parcels for family members and a few friends.


William Randolph Hearst, owner of The Herald, took exception to his newspaper being in the real estate business and on June 12, 1924, an article in The Herald announced; "HERALD HARBOR COMPANY IS NOT A HEARST NEWSPAPER PROJECT." On July 1, 1924, the property was conveyed to an independent corporation, Herald Harbor, Inc. Officers of the corporation were Rhey Snodgrass, former Herald Harbor publisher, president; William Shelton, former Herald circulation manager, secretary-treasurer; and C.S. Eddy, vice-president.

The property was surveyed into 25' x 100' lots for selling for \$25 a lot or \$200 for waterfront lots. Herald Harbor was advertised as a summer beach colony for Washingtonians. On June 13, 1924, an ad in The Herald states "practically 3,000 lots have been sold.... the size and speed of the movement toward Herald Harbor has dumbfounded our most imaginative salesmen.

Shelton Park was built on the waterfront lots at the intersection of North and South Riverside. The Park was cleared of trees for parking spaces. A dance pavilion was built at the top of the hill and steps ran down the hill to the beach. On the beach were bathhouses, a boardwalk and picnic facilities. A dock was constructed to accommodate the boaters, canoeists, fishermen, and those desiring a 25 cent ride on the excursion launch. Sandwiches and homemade crab cakes and drinks could be purchased at the refreshment stand on the beach. Boats, fishing tackle and bait could be had if visitors wished to fish in the waters of Severn River or Valentine Creek, both which abound in fish of all kinds. They could be cooked and eaten right on the club grounds.

People turned out in droves. They came by automobile or special excursion trains on the W.B.&A. electric railway being run from 15th and H. Streets, Northeast, DC to Gott Stations, where motor buses transported the excursions to Herald Harbor, two miles distant. Sales offices for lots opened in Baltimore at 19 Guilford Avenue that summer, and by the end of summer, a record crowd of over 12,000 people from Washington and Baltimore had come as investors or visitors to Herald Harbor.

## Looking for a Good Book?

Fall is here forcing us to move from the lazy days of summer to the busy days of school, work and preparing yards and gardens for winter. This edition includes books of essays that can be enjoyed in short spurts between other commitments.

Late Migrations: A Natural History of Love and Loss by Margaret Renkl: Renkl has a weekly, opinion essay in The New York Times and is the author of my previously recommended The Comfort of Crows: A Backyard Year. In this collection we meet Renkl's parents as she moves from being their daughter to being their caregiver. Renkl's caregiving essays are beautifully interwoven with essays that pull in the natural world around her Nashville home. Billy Renkl, the author's brother, is Late Migrations illustrator. Such an amazing duo!

**The Book of Delights: Essays** by Ross Gay: Published in 2019 by an award-winning poet, this is a collection of his memoir essays written from birthday to birthday. This is his first non-fiction book. In a time that seems filled with anxiety and political turmoil, we can learn much from Gay's lesson in focusing on the little joys that happen in our lives. There are 102 essays, some as short as a paragraph and some several pages, beginning with "My Birthday" and ending with "My Birthday."

**Upstream** by Mary Oliver: A book of essays written by another award-winning poet known for her love of nature and quiet walks in the woods. "As she contemplates the pleasure of artistic labor, finding solace and safety within the woods, and the joyful and rhythmic beating of wings, Oliver intimately shares with her readers her quiet discoveries, boundless curiosity, and exuberance for the grandeur of our world." (goodreads.com)

I Was Told There'd Be Cake: Essays by Sloane Crossley: A New York Times bestseller. Crosley is a two-time finalist for the Thurber Prize for American Humor. Written as a memoir, Crosley encourages us to laugh at her experiences in fifteen essays with titles like "Bring your machete to work day." "From despoiling an exhibit at the Natural History Museum to provoking the ire of her first boss to siccing the cops on her mysterious neighbor, Crosley can do no right despite the best of intentions -- or perhaps because of them." 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## The Birds and the ...Fish

While a lot of the geese and other migratory birds have been flying south for the last couple of months, waterfowl enthusiasts will be heading over the Bay Bridge to Easton, Maryland in another month. The 53rd iteration of their Waterfowl Festival will hit town November 8-10 for a weekend full of fun and education.

Founded in 1971, the festival was conceived to celebrate and preserve Chesapeake Bay traditions and eventually has grown to be a nationally known event that attracts artists, conservationists and wildlife enthusiasts. Its mission has remained the same from the start: to raise funds for waterfowl habitat conservation while providing a platform for artists to showcase their work and for visitors to engage with the natural world.


In addition to art and historic artifacts (like decoys) on exhibit, there will be live programs and displays for those into hunting, fishing and other outdoor pursuits. A fishing derby is a highlight, and you can also enjoy various demonstrations including a retrieving dog exhibition. Did you know that Easton High School is home to the World Goose Calling Championship? It was founded in 1976 and is the longest-running goose calling championship in the US. Who knew?

There's lots of stuff designed for families where kids can enjoy hands-on activities including crafts and educational programs centered around wildlife and the outdoors. Make time to visit the Fishmobile equipped with interactive display tanks devoted to Bay species and Skyhunters in Flight, an exciting educational demonstration with live birds of prey.

All of this, plus good food, live music and special guests adds up to a great day out. Dress for the weather as the festival goes on rain or shine. For more information and to get tickets visit
